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### Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow

There are two days in every week that we should not worry about, two days that should be kept free from fear and apprehension.

One of them is YESTERDAY, with its mistakes and cares, its faults and blunders, its aches and pains. Yesterday has passed, forever beyond our control. All the money in the world cannot bring back yesterday. We cannot undo a single act we performed. Nor can we erase a single word we've said--yesterday is gone (Psa. 90:4).

The other day we shouldn't worry about is TOMORROW, with its impossible adversaries, its burden, its hopeful promise and poor performance. Tomorrow is beyond our control. If God wills, tomorrow's sun will rise, either in splendor or behind a mask of clouds--but it will rise. And until it does, we have no stake in tomorrow, for it is yet unborn. For you do not know what a day may bring forth (Pro. 27:1; Matt. 6:34; Jas. 4:14).

This leaves only one day--TODAY. A person can fight the battles of just one day. It is only when we add the burdens of yesterday and tomorrow that we break down. It is not the experience of today that drives people mad--it is the remorse of bitterness for

something which happened yesterday, and the dread of what tomorrow may bring. Let us, therefore live but one day at a time! "Therefore, just as the Holy Spirit says: 'Today if you will hear His voice, do not harden your hearts...'" (Heb. 3:7-8).

## A Sharp Tongue

Have you ever noticed how easy it is to identify the faults of others? After making a new acquaintance at a social function, we may feel a strong temptation to share unflattering observations with family or friends. A sharp tongue makes cutting remarks about personal appearance, hygiene, weight, grammar, manners, mannerisms, dress, accent, and so on. One of Solomon's proverbs declares that "there is one whose rash words are like sword thrusts" (Prov. 12:18).

We may tell ourselves that the habit of making hurtful, behind-the-back remarks is innocent. We do not mean anything by it. We truly love people. Our hearts are in the right place. Jesus says otherwise: "Out of the abundance of the heart the mouth speaks. The good man out of his good treasure brings forth good, and the evil man out of his evil treasure brings forth evil" (Matt. 12:34-35). Harsh, critical comments come from a condemning, judgmental heart.

Why is cutting speech so tempting? Perhaps the chief appeal of harsh criticism is self-promotion. For instance, a woman's comment on the round shape of a chubby neighbor may draw attention to her own slim figure. Or a man's remarks about a coworker's poor grammar may focus attention on his superior education.

However, promoting self at the expense of others backfires. People usually do not like or trust a condemning person. They wonder what the harsh critic says about them when their own backs are turned. Furthermore, judgmental people tend to get generous doses of their own bitter medicine. If I habitually say hurtful things about others, then my friends and acquaintances are probably picking me apart too. "Judge not," Jesus said, "that you be not judged. For with the judgment you pronounce you will be judged, and the measure you give will be the measure you get" (Matt. 7:1-2).
