THANKSGIVING

In a few days our nation will pause and celebrate Thanksgiving. As we as a nation stop to give thanks, it may appear there is little to be thankful for. A short time spent listening to the national news or reading the newspaper would indicate times are bad and getting worse. Is this really the case? Do we have any reason to give thanks? Yes we do. We can be thankful for our nation. America is certainly not perfect and we all should do our part to improve the nation. But what other country provides the freedom and opportunity that ours does? We can worship God without governmental interference. We are not required to pay taxes to support the nationally recognized religion and it's particular practices. Nor are we required to participate in that religion's public observances.

We can be thankful for Jesus. He died for our sins, receiving the punishment we rightly deserve (Isaiah 53:1-12; Titus 2:14; I Peter 2:24). John wrote that Jesus "is the propitiation for our sins" (I John 2:2). To propitiate is to "appease (an offended person)" (The Oxford Dictionary and Thesaurus, page 1199). Before the Jewish council Peter proclaimed, "Neither is there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved" (Acts 4:12). Without Jesus there is no hope of salvation from sin. Nor can one find release from the guilt sins bring.

Jesus promised to build His church and then did it (Matthew 16:18; Acts 2:47). The church is where God places the saved (Acts 2:47). The church serves as: the bride of Christ (Ephesians 5:22-33); the body of Christ (Ephesians 1:22, 23; Colossians 1:18); the temple of God (I Corinthians 3:10-16); it is also the family or household of God (I Timothy 3:15).

We can also be thankful for the way Jesus organized the church. With each congregation independent and self-ruling from all others, there is the safeguard against apostasy. When a congregation departs from "the faith once delivered to the saints" (Jude 3), no other congregation is compelled to follow. If the structure involved one congregation or one eldership or one man over several congregations, then when the leading church departs all those under their authority would also depart.

The leadership of the local congregation belonging to an eldership made up of two or more men meeting specified qualifications is another thing to be thankful for. These men bring a check and balances to the leadership. This structure prevents one man from imposing his will rather than the Lord's will on the congregation.

As this article closes, consider one more area of thanks: your personal blessings. As the song we sing admonishes "Count your blessings, name them one by one. Count your blessings see what God has done." As you count you will no doubt be amazed how much you personally can be thankful for.

A Biblical Mondegreen

A mondegreen is a word or phrase that results from a mishearing of something spoke. For example, “very close veins” is a mondegreen for “varicose veins.”

Children often say the funniest mondegreens: The Egyptians were all drowned in the dessert. Afterwards, Moses went up on Mount Cyanide to get the 10 amendments. Moses died and could not go into Canada and Joshua fought the battle of Geritol. The greatest miracle in the Bible is when Joshua told his son to stand still and he obeyed him. King David played a liar and fought the Finklesteins. Solomon had 300 wives and 700 porcupines. Jesus had 12 decibels. One of the opossums was Matthew and he was a taxi man. Who is Art in heaven (Matthew 6:9)?

Sometimes we sing mondegreens. When Hannah was three years old, she would sing the “Lord’s Army” this way: “I may never march in the apple tree, ride in the Cavity...” Perhaps you have heard “Bringing in the Sheets” or have asked, “Are You Sowing the Seed of the King, dumb brother?” How about “Andy walks with me, Andy talks with me?” Maybe you’ve heard in the chorus “Oh, Come All Ye Faithful,” “Oh, come let us ignore Him.”

That last mondegreen sums up a true mondegreen found in Mark 15:34. At the edge of death, Jesus shouted “Eloi, Eloi lamah sabachthani,” but the people misheard him. They thought that he was calling for Elijah (Mark 15:34). It’s not surprising. Their hearts were already stopped up and their hearts were dull. They ignored His teachings. Why would the occasion of the cross be any different (cf. Isaiah 6:10; 59:1; Matthew 13:15; Acts 28:27; Hebrews 5:11)?

People still ignore him today. Yes, they adore baby Jesus this time of year, but they dismiss the teachings of the Son of Man the rest of the year. Why wrestle with the reason for the cross and its demands, when you can keep baby Jesus in the manger? People create “mondegreens” of His teachings; only hearing what is easy for them to swallow. For example, “judge not” could easily pass as the most famous and most important for those who wish to live how they want. However, those who love Jesus will hear Him speaking clearly and will submit to Him.

May God help us to have open ears to hear His plain teaching.+++
