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## Making Wise Use of Our Time

If we are wise, we understand how to use time to its fullest. We arrange our priorities and do first things first (Matthew 6:33). We structure each day so that we get the most out of the time we are allotted. We understand the preciousness of living each moment we have, knowing that time is fleeting and our appointment with death and judgment is a certainty (Hebrews 9:27).

Scripture addresses the importance of using our time wisely while we have it. The Psalmist requests, "So teach us to number our days, That we may get us a heart of wisdom" (Psalm 90:12). Paul exhorts us, "See then that ye walk circumspectly, not as fools, but as wise, redeeming the time, because the days are evil" (Ephesians 5:15-16).

Jesus recognized the brevity of His time on earth to do His Father's will – "I must work the works of him that sent me, while it is day: the night cometh, when no man can work" (John 9:4). It is certainly appropriate to exhort our youth to "remember thy creator in the days of thy youth...." (Ecclesiastes 12:1).

We need to habitually "exhort one another daily while it is called To day; lest any of you be hardened through the deceitfulness of sin" (Hebrews 3:13). Why? because today is all we have (James 4:13-14). The following poem (by an unknown author) entitled "No Time For God?" further illustrates the wise use of our time in spiritual matters.

"You've time to build houses, and in them dwell,  
And time to do business — to buy and to sell;  
And none for repentance, or deep earnest prayer;  
To seek your salvation you've no time to spare.

You've time for earth's pleasures, for frolic and fun,  
For her glittering treasures how quickly you run;

## **The Certainty of Death and Our Preparation for It**

The story is told of a man who decided to move to a warmer climate because of poor health. Wanting to make sure he would choose the area best suited to his needs, he visited several Western State locations.

While in Arizona, he asked a man about the average temperature, humidity, and the number of days the sun shined. When he asked about the death rate, the man answered, "Same as where you come from, friend — one death for every birth."

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Despite all of the medical progress we've seen in prolonging life and improving its quality, the death rate remains virtually unchanged. The Hebrew writer tells us, "It is appointed for men to die once" (Hebrews 9:27), because "all have sinned" (Romans 3:23) and "the wages of sin is death" (Romans 6:23).

It is essential that we understand the progression — that death follows life, and that after death comes the judgment.

Everyone who is "in Christ" (Gal. 3:26-27), will come forth from the grave "to the resurrection of life," but everyone who rejects Him will "come forth .... to the resurrection of condemnation" (John 5:29).

For non-Christians, death seals their eternal doom (Romans 2:4-5,8-9) — a state where there is no reprieve. But for faithful Christians, death leads to glory, honor, peace, and immortality (Romans 2:7,10).

Wise is the person who faces up to the certainty of death. And wiser still is the one who prepares for it (Matthew 25:1-13).
