Size Matters Not

On Labor Day, as my family and I were driving down Hamburg Pike between Veterans and Charlestown-New Albany Road, we noticed that the parking lot in the field was full of cars. As we turned down Charlestown-New Albany Road, we saw the reason. It turned out to be the annual Labor Day festival for one of the large denominations in Jeffersonville. As we passed by, the church building was surrounded by all kinds of bounce houses and games. People seemed to be having a pretty good time in the 90F weather.

A series of questions came to mind about the event. Was it a fund-raiser or if it was free? How many of those who came will come to the church services there? What does the Lord think of these activities? It is tempting to become discouraged and to compare what the Lord's church might be doing or not doing. Are we willing to do all that we can, short of sinning, to bring people to Jesus? Are fun activities the way to do it? It can be tempting to think that a small church is insignificant and has nothing to offer the world.

However, when we think carefully about it, many things that the Lord has chosen as his instruments have never been that significant. Israel was chosen not because of her size or importance (Deut. 7:6-8). Thirty-two thousand men showed up to be recruited by Gideon, but only 300 made the cut (Judges 7). One young man came out against Goliath while Israel's toughest warriors cowered at the sight of him (1 Samuel 17:45). A band of twelve mismatched men preached news about the kingdom that shook the foundations of the world while itself being unshaken (cf. Hebrew 12:28).

The Lord chose Israel because He loved her. The Lord told Gideon the reason why he wanted so few to go into battle against the Midianites: "The people with you are too many for me to give the Midianites into their hand, lest Israel boast over me, saying, 'My own hand has saved me' (Judges 7:2). David recognized that the battle belongs to the Lord (1 Samuel 17:47).

What does a small congregation do to grow? David wrote in Psalm 20:7, "Some trust in chariots and some in horses, but we trust in the name of the LORD our God." We cannot improve upon that which attracts people to God. We do not trust in human strategies like buildings, games, gimmicks, fads and flash. Rather, we trust in the gospel of Jesus to attract others. Jesus Himself said, "And I if I be lifted up from the earth will draw all men to me" (John 12:32). The good news of the cross both preached and lived out by His messengers is what will draw people. Who are His messengers? Those faithful followers in His church who live and breathe Jesus every day (cf. Acts 8:4).

Second, we remember that size matters not, but faithfulness to God matters in everything. Therefore, we focus on spiritual growth. Those who mature in the Lord will always see the need to teach others the gospel. They pray for more workers in his harvest (Matthew 9:38) and then they become one of those workers. They plant and water then they trust in God to grow it (1 Corinthians 3:6-7).
