Building Up Our Children: Responsibility Eric Welch

One of the reasons why gun violence has creeped into our schools is because children are not learning the Three R's. The first was respect. Respect for parents. Respect for others. Respect for themselves. In fact, self-respect leads to the second of the Three R's--responsibility. How do we raise responsible children? Let me suggest that responsibility is learning by teaching children self-control.

Self-control is basically the ability to stop and think before acting in any situation and then make good choices. It's when a brother decides not to argue with his sister or hit her over a video game. He has controlled his emotions. Self-control is the ability to set a goal and stay driven toward it even when tempted to stray. It's when a girl chooses to stick to her homework when she is tempted to click on a smartphone game app close by. Self-control is the ability to delay pleasure. Have you seen the Youtube video in which a few children are placed in a room with a marshmallow on a plate? The instructor says that they can eat the marshmallow now or wait and have two when she returns. It is humorous to watch the children struggle with self-control, to delay the pleasure of tasting the yummy marshmallow.

Self-control established early will help children gain self-respect and good habits. Walter Mischel, a social psychologist and university professor, found that children who show self-control at an early age went on to make better grades, develop an excellent work ethic and to be less likely to abuse drugs. Self-esteem had nothing to do with it; self-control had everything to do with it.

Note the wise Proverbs of Solomon regarding self-control: 10:4 "A slack hand causes poverty, but the hand of the diligent makes rich;" 25:16 If you have found honey, eat only enough for you, lest you have your fill of it and vomit it.; 29:11 A fool gives full vent to his spirit, but a wise man quietly holds it back. Of course, self-control is a characteristic that God wants us to develop (Galatians 5:22-23; 2 Peter 1:6).

Responsibility involves the ability to use self-control and self-control is the best form of gun control.
